### Discussion:

- 1) Connecticut Lions Eye Research: Tim Carlson gave a brief history of the Connecticut Lions Eye Research Foundation. It has raised seven million dollars since its inception in 1956 and currently developed a Kid Sight Program that partners with schools and Lions as well as a Veterans Stand Down project for veterans in need.
- 2) The In-Kind Donation Woodstock Cornet Band: Calvin Neely noted that this donation is for the preservation of the Band's portable bandstand mill truck with a needed paint job. A brief history taught us that when the 1938 Hurricane hit, all the bandstands in the Woodstock area were destroyed, but the love of music wasn't, so the Band utilized the truck as its traveling bandstand to perform for local towns.
- 3) The Brooklyn Fairgrounds has absorbed miscellaneous expenses on our behalf during past years. This donation will help to reimburse and cover some of these expenses for future truck shows.
- 4) Addie Coderre is a young girl from the Woodstock area battling cancer and there is large community support to help the family offset treatment expenses.

There were no further nominations for other organizations and no changes in the monetary amounts.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Board of Directors recommends that these be considered as Year 2021 Charitable Donations from the Brooklyn Truck Show for a total of \$7850.00. The balance of the Show Account will be transferred to the savings account for future donations.

Motion was made and seconded to approve the Board's recommendation

<u>ACTION:</u> Members present voted unanimously on the charitable donation list and transfer of balance.

The Board of Directors is recommending that the donations received in memory of Kenny Miller be used to purchase a 6X12 engraved brick that will be part of the landscaping patio pavers at the entrance of ATHS Headquarters in Kansas City, MO. The brick will honor both Kenny and Daisy and will be engraved to read:

Motion made and seconded to use the donations in this manner

Jon recalls the fire at the Miller's and his visit to them and the loss of the prized family trucks that Ken said were a part of him.

### Joseph Pingitore, III 1961 – 2021

Nutmeg member and founding member of the Ocean State Vintage Haulers Rhode Island Chapter, **Joseph Pingitore**, **III** passed away suddenly on October 25, 2021 at the early age of 60.

Joe started J. Pingitore & Sons Asphalt Paving in 1985. He was a perfectionist in his trade and took much pride in his work. As a pastime, he restored dozens of antiques to pristine condition and was the President of Ocean State Vintage Haulers (ATHS). On top of all the antiques he fixed and collected, he was also a man who never said no when his family or friends showed up at the garage with something that was not running right. When he was not working or helping someone, you could find Joe riding his Harley Davidson or taking his Corvette out for a spin.

Joseph is survived by his three sons; Joseph Pingitore IV (Nicole), Dylan Pingitore, Jonathan Pingitore, his brother David Pingitore (Lynn), and his sister, Francine Pingitore, uncles, aunt, cousins and friends. His funeral was held on November 2 from the Woodlawn Funeral Home in Cranston, R. I. Memorial donations may be made to the Ocean State Vintage Haulers, 21A Rocky Hill Road, Smithfield RI 02917. The members of the Nutmeg Chapter extend our heartfelt sympathy to his family, friends and ATHS members.

**Margaret Philbrook**, also a member of the Nutmeg Chapter, notified the members of the Ocean State Vintage Haulers with the following statement:

Joe was a founding member of the Ocean State Vintage Haulers Rhode Island Chapter since 1995. He was a member of the American Truck Historical Society since 1991, a member of the Nutmeg Chapter ATHS, the Vintage Motorcycle Club and the Rhode Island Antique Fire Apparatus Society.

Joe started in his teens repairing motors. Age 13 through 16 he owned his own lawn mower repair business, then progressing to repairing cars, trucks and motorcycles. Joe went to college for machine design and was a CB three years, working as a heavy equipment mechanic. Since 1985 he established Joseph Pingitore & Sons, Inc. Joe was a candidate for and won the Ocean State Vintage Haulers office of President on November 27, 2005 until the present, 15 years and 11 months.

### **Arnold Briggs offers memories of Joe Pingitore**

Joe was the heartbeat of the Ocean State Club. With his cigar chomping, and a black Sambuca always close by, Joe kept things going at a fast pace.

Nearby was his side kick Ron Rossi, (vice president of the club ), and together they would put on the best fall BBQ steak feast anywhere in the state of Rhode Island. Members would scramble to get the early tickets, as there was a limit. Serving nearly 150 persons, it was the place to be. Who could ask for anything more than a delightful day at a truck show; a tour of the Rossi 100+ acre tree farm; a ride on tracked US Army vehicles, a slow hay wagon ride pulled by antiques tractors, through the well-manicured Christmas trees ready for harvesting, always ending at the big tent for the BBQ feast that was being cooked by Joe, Ron and Joe's three sons, friends and other club members.

Joe was a key person at the 2012 ATHS National truck show held at the BIG E in West Springfield, MA. If anything was required, Joe was always there to help. It was Joe's idea to hold a National show in New England and so we did.

We are all going to really miss him. He usually had about one-third of the members at the monthly meetings, and who would forget the pizzas at the close of the meetings.

Joe, you can now rest in peace my friend, your work here is complete and you can now be with your LORD GOD, who you have loved so dearly. Rest in peace Joe, where the antique Mack's, Fords, and Sterling's will always be there with you. This is how I see it, what a guy, we are all going to miss him.



### Robert C. Sorensen 1933 - 2021

Longtime Nutmeg member **Robert C. Sorensen, 88, of Woodbridge**, passed away at his home on Saturday, October 23, 2021. Born in New Haven May 8, 1933, Bob was a lifelong resident of Woodbridge. Robert truly lived a full life. A visionary man, he built many lasting relationships. He was compassionate, approachable, kind and generous, with a great sense of humor and a strong work ethic. He was a third generation owner/operator of his own school bus for over 60 years, known to his passengers as "Mr. Bob." He also owned several other transportation businesses and several antique trucks. He loved to plan trips and travel with his wife; together they saw the world.

He is survived by his beloved wife, Georgianna Hubbell Sorensen, daughter Amy (John) Wood of Frankfort, IL, son Christian Sorensen, his former daughter-in-law Amy B. My Dad worked for J. William Holt Dairy Farms from 1945 (the year I was born) until November 1954. Holt had a 1937 -1940 International D-30 or D-35 Stake truck. When I was 8 or 9, Dad would drive it home and I would go crazy. I knew I would be riding in it. When I was 9, I had the best dream of Dad in that truck. I dreamt we were going up a hill and Dad kept down shifting and down shifting. On November 9, 1954 Holt's barn burned down and the International was heavily damaged and I never saw it again. Dad passed away July 20, 1991. The next day the Nutmeg Chapter had its meeting at Kenny Miller's. Strange things do happen. I saw a truck just like it, same year range, same model, same color-maroon, and same stakebody. I wish I could have bought it as a monument to Dad.

# 1936 IHC—Buried Treasure

There is a hole in my bathroom floor that has been growing steadily for three years, but my husband just hasn't had time to fix it. Oh, I know that some chores require a lot of thought before they're tackled, and the mood has to be just right. However, not long ago, while doing some scraping on an old farm in Connecticut, he made a discovery which stopped all the clocks in our house—including the one in the bathroom.

Dave found a 1936 IHC C40 in a barn on the property. Well, actually, the truck wasn't just *in* the barn, it was *holding up* the barn. The son of the deceased owner said that in 1958, when Route 91 was going through, this barn stood in the way of the proposed highway, and his father had had to move it or lose it. Being the ingenious old gent that he was, he simply drove the old 3-ton truck into the barn, stacked timbers crisscross on the flatbed until the pile reached the rafters, then with a chain saw, cut the sides away from the foundation and drove the barn to a spot that was closer to his house and out of the way of the interstate.

During the intervening time, trees had grown up around the barn, and a collection of dead tractors, including a 9N Ford that had been struck by a train back in 1952, and antiquated farm equipment, had taken up residence among the trees and weeds. In a nearby shed were two Farmall H tractors, settled axle deep into the earth.

Needless to say, within an hour of his discovery, my darling was on the phone to his friend and fellow ATHS member Ken Miller, collector of Internationals, Federals, Dodges, and Stewarts, and owner of a rollback that has brought many a contraption into our yard. Kenny hastened to the scene to share Dave's momentous discovery—he probably didn't have any household chores that needed doing, either.

The only part of the truck that was visible in the barn was the grille and headlights, but once Kenny spotted it, he was in love. For the next four days I never saw my husband. He and Kenny spent their valuable time hauling and scrapping the iron around the barn, cutting a path through the weeds to get to the barn, and clearing stuff away from the truck inside the barn—and that was just the beginning!


Since the truck was still the main support of the barn, they had to jack up the 10-ft high pile of timbers on the bed very carefully in order to free the vehicle. Then came the tricky part. Scott Viets, another ATHS member who is the slickest backhoe operator I've ever seen, maneuvered his 580 Case through the path to the barn and backed it up to the old Combinder in a space that I couldn't have driven a Volkswagen Bug through. (Yes, I watched the final phase of this operation.)

For the next few minutes we all held our breath as, ever so slowly and gently, Scott inched the old girl right out of the barn, through the woods, and onto the road. Lo and




Above: This is how the situation looked upon discovery.

### Richard Laiho's Sawmill Struck by Lightning

On the morning of November 14<sup>th</sup>, 2021 a major fire destroyed Richard Laiho's sawmill building and a number of pieces of equipment such as a dump truck, skid loaders, a backhoe, large fixed generator as well as the sawmill table and related materials.

Harold and Tom visited with Richard at the mill site on Wednesday Nov. 23 and found Richard in reasonably good spirits. He informed them that the Fire Marshall indicated that the cause of the fire was most likely from a lightning strike from a severe storm that hit the area several hours before the fire was called in that morning. Richard mentioned that he did not carry any fire insurance on the structure or equipment.

Richard said he would do small jobs as he pleased, but at the moment he is focused on cleaning up the mess, as he put it. He does have friends helping him with the cleaning and salvage operation.

Based on the catastrophic loss of property, the officers sought and gained the approval of the Board of Directors to issue Richard a check from our regular account in the sum of \$500. This would be in line with past allotments that the club has made to other members who have faced life-changing events in the past several years.

We hope that Richard can recover from this loss quickly and wish him well in the future as he looks forward to a better 2022.
