Bowen's is an operational 101-year-old certified Ford dealership in Connecticut. The garage maintains a full service shop from parts to sales of midsize trucks to electric vehicles. A motion was made to accept the Treasurer's Report as presented. The motion was seconded and vote was unanimous to accept the report.

## Membership Report: Lance Dimock

Lance reported that membership is now at 153. We have nine new members who joined our Chapter since our Show. The distribution of membership forms to each show truck is a productive tool in gaining new members and we will continue to do that. Six members paid their dues at the show leaving us with 17 currently in arrears. According to our By-Laws, those members will be dropped from our Membership Roster and will no longer receive the Newsletter. The Nutmeg Chapter Newsletter is always available on our Website.

## Newsletter: Donald Arnauckas, Editor

Don reported that the deadline for the September-October edition is July 31, 2023. Members are encouraged to contact Don regarding the For Sale/Wanted pages, as well as any news or articles that you would like to submit. Don has received questions about a few New England area shows. Don noted that the Topland Farms Open House at Dudley Diebold's is October 21, 2023 and that any information he receives from other Chapters will be posted on Facebook, and in our Newsletter. Thank you to Jon Yeomans for taking additional photos of the show and posting them on Facebook.

## Website and Social Media: Kathy Arnauckas

Kathy stated that all Photos from the Brooklyn Show are currently on Facebook and the Website. Kathy noted that Pete Sears is most helpful in keeping our website up to date. Other organizations and truck clubs have requested that we post their show posters on our Facebook page and we continue to accommodate these requests.

#### Show Report: Discussion led by Tom Bachand

Tom stated that once again we had a very successful Truck Show, both financially with truck registration and spectators. We had 270 truck/vehicles registered, and had the day not been so iffy weather-wise, we would have easily surpassed the 270 vehicles that did come to the show. Receipts totaled \$14,138 with a profit of close to \$8000.

**John Raymond,** our Show Chair, was not able to attend the meeting, but Tom stated that without the help from the American Legion who helped with the spectator gates, the local Girl Scout Troop who did a superb job of parking cars, the Chapter would have had a very hard time pulling this off. Last minute volunteers and some family members were a tremendous help in supplementing members who worked the show. Tom expressed his gratitude for John's expert organization of our show.

Harold Foskett reported that the Show Truck Gate area went well, with little backup on the road.

**Charlie Dainton**, our <u>Flea Market</u> guy, said things ran smoothly there also with over 50 spots utilized. The use of paint striping to mark off the areas worked well and was less time consuming. Lance helped him on Saturday and Jonathan Yeomans helped on Sunday to get the Flea Market area up and running quickly.

**Maggie McCormick** reported that all went well with the <u>Toy Barn</u>; it ran smoothly, all spots were filled and the vendors were happy. One vendor, who chose not to come due to the questionable weather, sent the Chapter a donation anyway.

**Sales, Membership & Registration**: We sold all but a few T-shirts, \$20 did not seem to be an issue and Tom reminded that the price of the T-shirts went up considerably this year. Lance Dimock reported that we have had nine new members join our Chapter since the truck show and we had some renewals and rejoins at the show. Having Membership in the Chapter area proved beneficial. The truck registration booth ran smoothly thanks to some additional help from family volunteers. Thanks to Patty Bachand, Margaret Philbrook, Lois Dimock, Kathy Arnauckas & Christine Ward for making it work.

**The Main Gate** was manned by the American Legion Post from Woodstock and they did a fine job and are looking forward to helping out next year. They even have a few suggestions to help with the flow. A \$500 donation to the American Legion will be made. We could not have done it without them and we look forward to their help in 2024.

We are thankful for members Tim Carlson, Rob Giuliano and Maggie's friend Brian, who came forward on Sunday to handle the **Back Gate.** Once again, the **local Girl Scout Troop** handled the spectator parking lot with ease. We are grateful for their assistance and they will receive a \$500 donation for their help with our show.

Tom stated that while we were still shorthanded, we managed to have another successful show. He thanked family members including some grandchildren for stepping up when the need arose. There is still a great need for assistance with large truck parking and we need to work on that for next year. He thanked those who helped in anyway including the Arnauckas grandsons who sold water to our thirsty spectators. It was a long, tiring day, and the effort put forth by our members is noted!

The Chapter is also looking for another non-profit organization who can give us additional help at the Gates. This will free up our Chapter Volunteers to do other tasks that have been neglected in the past due to low staffing.

## OLD BUSINESS:

1. <u>Annual Dinner Meeting with Election of Officers</u>: Matthews Catering has been contracted for this year's annual dinner. Tom reported that the cost per person has increased to \$29.99, so let's say \$30 plus 18% gratuity that the Chapter covers. The actual cost per dinner including the additional gratuity will be \$35.40. Inflation and the cost of supplies was not unexpected. In addition, most members present suggested to Tom that we request that the caterer cook the beef longer as it continues to be too rare for most of us.

A lengthy discussion on what to charge members and guests resulted in two proposals as follows:

Proposal One:Members (including spouses) \$20Guests \$25(Club absorbing \$15.40 & \$10.40 per dinner)Proposal Two:Members (including spouses) \$25Guests \$30(Club absorbing \$10.40 & 5.40 per dinner)

A motion was made and seconded to vote by a show of hands on each proposal.

Proposal One: Five for \$20/\$25 Proposal Two: Nine for \$25/\$30

Therefore, the motion to charge Proposal Two of \$25 for members and \$30 for Guests will be the fee for this year's dinner.

2. Tom again stated that the position of Treasurer remains open. The Treasurer position has been open for well over a year. Tom stated that no one has inquired about or expressed an interest in the Treasurer's position. He continues to fill both positions.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Tom wants Chapter members to be aware that many of us are receiving fake e-mails and messages that appear to be from Nutmeg officers. Do not reply to these emails or click on to any link that may be in the email. National has been hacked and this is an on-going problem with National. A letter will be sent from Tom to the President on the National level for them to address this issue.

# Hundreds Came To Truck Expo In Bethany, Conn.

Second annual Truck & Equipment Expo drew many new exhibitors—including a large antique contingent—to airport site THE TEMPERATURE was tickling 90 degrees both days, as truckers, suppliers and others from throughout Connecticut and beyond descended on the Old Bethany Airport on Friday and Saturday, September 10 and 11, for their big new annual event of the first weekend after Labor Day—the Truck & Equipment Expo sponsored by the Maintenance & Equipment Council of the Motor Transport Association of Connecticut (MTAC).

Dressing for sunburn was the order of the two days, as a brilliant sun brought out unseasonably high temperatures, some humidity, ragweed pollen—and hundreds of visitors—in Bethany, located 15 miles north of New Haven on state Route 63. The council took over the entire grass runway of the old time rural airport for exhibits by nearly 50 truck dealers and suppliers to the trucking industry. Both the spacious outdoor area and two large tents were used to house the exhibitors—and kept the large number of visitors deceptively diffused throughout the area.

Antique trucks played a big role in this year's event. A number of the vintage vehicles, ranging from a Rumley Oil Pull farm tractor to the usual collection of Diamond T's and Mack Bulldogs, were on display at the far end of the runway. A trio of gasoline powered onelunger water pumps even showed up for the event.

Two tours of the highways in the area were made by the old trucks led by Bob Sorensen of the Sorensen



Transportation Co., Inc., of Bethany in his 1948 Diamond T. The first one, on Friday morning, made a 30-mile circuit of the area to the north and west of New Haven, stopping for a half hour at the Mayflower Truck Station in Milford.

Howard Merk, Mayflower president, was on hand-without his Indian headdress-to greet the old trucks and their drivers and passengers as they rolled up to his fuel islands. It took a ride in those old and not-soold vehicles to realize again the rugged determination which had to be displayed by truckmen to complete their appointed rounds only a few short decades ago. It was a good thing that urbanization had not taken hold in those days when the impact of rough suspensions on rougher roads had a direct effect on the backs and kidneys of the operators. Undoubtedly, very few roadside trees suffered from dehydration in those days.

A steady stream of automobiles kept arriving and leaving the airport. Tom Ross, MTAC public relations director, and his crew handled the registrants as they arrived at the gate. There was ample room for them to spread out over the wide grassy landing area-which was closed to aircraft for the two days of events-to see everything from complete tractor and trailer combinations to the smallest components and services.

George Bitgood of Cummins Diesel Engines of Connecticut, Inc., was chairman of the event. A display of

vehicles owned and in daily service by some of the Nutmeg State's leading truck fleets-with the pertinent statistics of their service lives-ringed the open field.

Food service was catered by the Bethany Volunteer Fire Department. Three demonstrations of righting an overturned tractor and trailer using inflatable airbags were given again this year by Halprin's Service of Hartford. The second expo follows one held in North Haven in May 1981-and is now firmly established on a growth track as the truck event for Connecticut.

On Saturday, a very active delegation from the American Truck Historical Society (ATHS) and its largest chapter, the Antique Truck Club of New England, provided additional old trucks for a run up Route 63 to Naugatuck and back. Roy Stewart of Manchester, N.H., ATHS president, and George Humphrey and Bill Semple, two of the vice presidents, led the group.

Highlighting the old time events was the official signing of documents establishing a new Southern New England Chapter of the ATHS. It is headed up by Bob Keene of Cummins of Connecticut.

George Bitgood reported that additional old trucks and other vehicles are already scheduled to attend the 1983 expo. Included next year will be more farm equipment, including steam-powered tractors and an old time horse-operated threshing machine.

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# An Afternoon at the Bowen's Garage

Visiting Bowen's Ford Dealership is like visiting a Ford Museum. While being an active Ford dealership in 2023, Bowen's maintains that early American motif in today's business world. You can see the latest Dynamometer in a 1930's building. I wonder how many modern Ford Dealerships even have a DYNO? The Nutmeg Chapter extends a hearty Thank You to the Bowen's for hosting our meeting. It was both interesting and informative. For those of you who missed this tour, we will post more photos on our Website. The History of Bowen's Garage follows.

Celebrating a Century: Four Generations of Bowen's Garage Inc.

Bowen's Garage Inc. was founded in 1922 by Oliver D. Bowen. Oliver was born and raised in Eastford, and attended technical school in Hartford. He sold bread to pay for his schooling. He then opened a general repair, livery, and dump truck service in the little garage just south of the present building on the east side of Route 198. He sold Fords that he got on consignment from Omera Ford in Hartford.

Oliver built the present building in 1930, and got his own Ford franchise that same year. Throughout the 1930s, he sold Ford and Mercury vehicles, as well as Lincoln Zephyrs. This is also when Spencer, Oliver's son, started working here. From 1939 to 1947, they sold Ford tractors as well. Spencer would vividly remember driving them home from the Abington train station. After World War II, tractors, Mercury, and Lincoln required a separate franchise, so the garage shifted to selling only Ford vehicles.

In 1948, the showroom and the cement floor portion of the shop were added on. The exterior of the building was renovated in 1994 after a strong wind removed the flat roof over the showroom.

Spencer worked at the garage his entire life, except for his time in the U.S. Army in the mid 1940s. He started working here when he was around 8 years old. His mother, Gertrude, looked out one day during Spencer's childhood, only to see a truck going through the back yard with no one in it. Spencer was standing on the running board so he could see to drive. He would go on to work every day at the garage until September 2008, when he retired at the age of 83. Even after retirement, in his later years, he regularly came over to help close up at 5 p.m., until he died in September 2013.

Spencer's son, Stephen, has a history at the garage that bears great resemblance to his father's. He started driving and working at the garage when he was 10, and has been here ever since. He started pumping gas in 1969, and in the decades to follow, would grow in his role until he eventually oversaw the majority of operations — a responsibility he now shares with his own son, Jonathan.

Jonathan started helping (and spent much time) at the garage when he was 10, and worked whenever he could throughout his college years. He graduated from college in 2013 with a business degree, came home, got married, and settled right in to the business. He has added new services and opportunities to help carry us into the next decade.

Each generation has brought different talents and knowledge to the business, all working together to get us to 100 years in business. Stephen, Jonathan, and their faithful employees want to sincerely thank their loyal customers who abled us to reach this milestone.

# **Nutmeg Chapter at a Turning Point** -- President and Treasurer Positions are OPEN

By this time, you are aware that the Chapter has two positions to fill when we meet in November. The prospect of closing the Nutmeg Chapter is a real possibility. We cannot maintain a Chapter without a <u>President and Treasurer</u>; under the Bylaws, they cannot be the same individual covering both offices. Tom Bachand has understandably made the tough decision to step back from both of these positions as of January 1, 2024. Each position can be dealt with individually, but dual responsibility can definitely kill the spirit. Moreover, we applaud Tom for all he has done these past two year and a half years to help keep the Nutmeg Chapter Strong & Healthy. We are listing the responsibilities of the two positions below. Tom has stated that he will help with the transition. Please, Please consider each position and honestly see if YOU might be able to keep us **Alive & Well** for another two years. **Get in touch with Tom as soon as possible.** 

**President -** (As identified in the Bylaws) - "The President shall preside over all meetings and give direction to the Chapter. The President shall appoint the Chairman of all committees and serve ex-officio on all committees."

-In addition, based on experience of recent past presidents, the President should expect to do the following: -Coordinate board meetings prior to full chapter business meetings

-Maintain a bi-partisan outlook and open minded approach to all business discussions during meetings. The President shall make decisions and recommendations that are in the best interest of the Chapter as a whole for the future health and growth of the Chapter.

-Record action items set during the Business Meetings and assign an active member for follow through with the action item. -Deliver a President's Message to the Newsletter editor in a timely fashion as set forth by the newsletter editor.

-Inspire volunteers to step up to help the Chapter with various tasks to further benefit Chapter activities.

**Treasurer's Duties** – (As defined in the Bylaws) the Treasurer shall account for all monies received in the name of the Chapter. He will pay all bills and present an accounting of all Chapter financial activity at each business meeting. The Treasurer is responsible for sending an Annual Chapter Financial Statement, accompanied by a copy of the Chapter's income and expense journal, countersigned by all elected officers of the Chapter to the ATHS Home Office no later than January 31 of the year following the activity report.

Note: Some computer skills are needed for these positions.
